

Growing Australian Native Plants in pots

Containers and preparation.

*Pots/containers can be of plastic, metal or clay, the clay pots should be sealed with a waterproof compound such as bondcrete [water based] so as to lessen drying out in summer months. All pots should be well drained and ideally from 175mm upwards in size, 200mm to 300mm pots probably would be most suited. Smaller pots such as 140-150mm are ideal for small gardens in the shorter term; once becoming pot bound can then be transferred to a larger container or planted out into the garden.

*Preparation; place approximately 25-35mm in depth of bluemetal/gravel into the container, cover with a film of shadecloth or filter cloth to prevent soil from silting up drain holes, this is important. Very important also, is to use a genuine Australian Native Plant potting mix as a potting medium, other potting mixes may well be too high in organics and nutrients and not drain as well.

*Fertilisers; as native plants are very efficient in utilising nutrients from the soil, the addition of synthetic/chemical fertilisers and strong fertilisers such as pig manure, sheep manure may be detriment to the health of the native plants. Regular watering of a liquid seaweed based fertiliser or similar is ideal. A slow release native fertiliser can be used but sparingly.

*Watering; do not over water! Keep moist in the summer and spring months allow winter rains to work, but keep watch, pots can dry out in winter as well!

*Australian native plants for pot growing
Austromyrtis dulcis Midyim berry. Small shrub, white sweet edible berries
Pimelea ferruginea. Rice flower, small rounded shrub, pink flowers in spring
Lechenaulta biloba. Small shrub, blue to pale blue flowers spring/winter (Pictured above left)

Lechenaulta formosa. Small prostrate shrub, orange, red flowers winter

Orthrosanthus multilflorus [morning iris] clumping leaf plant, blue flowers.

Pattersonia occidentalis Flag iris. Purple flowers, clumping leaf plant, 20cm

Thriptomene saxicola Pink thriptomene, small pink flowers winter. Prune.

Conostylus candicans. Yellow cottonheads. Clumping grey foliage.

Brachyscome multifida. Neat small plant, mauve yellow daisy like flowers

Thriptomene baeckeacea. [Dwarf] Small compact, pink flowers winter.

Correa Dusky bells. Small shrub, deep red tube flowers winter.

Alyogine pinnoniana. Dwarf hibiscus purple flowers summer. Prune to shape

Verticordia plumosa Pink flowers spring can prune hard.

Thriptomene denticulata. Small shrub, deep mauve pink flowers winter (Pictured above right)

Grevillea Mt Tamboritha. Small compact shrub, pink/white flowers winter

Grevillea Preissii dwarf. Compact soft fine foliage, red flowers winter spring

Nomination Requirements

Nominations must be on the prescribed form that is available from the Shire office.

An \$80 nomination deposit is required. You may pay your deposit in cash or by cheque, bank draft or postal order. If you make appropriate arrangements with the Returning Officer you may be able to pay your deposit by electronic transfer or other means. Nomination deposits are refunded after the election in some circumstances.

Candidates are required to provide a profile of the candidate consisting of no more than 150 words. Your nomination must include your name, address and contact numbers. The profile must be confined to information about you. It may include a recent passport size photo of your head or head and shoulders. The profile must be or be capable of being printed on a single A4 page.


If you are unable to personally attend to nominate, an authorised agent can do this on your behalf.

President's Pen

The President's Pen has been in hibernation for some time, mainly because the Shire was reporting decisions of Council in the Cuby News and, in general, we were both saying the same things. The other reason related to feed back. No one indicated to me if they liked or disliked the publication while it was running and again no comments after it stopped. My assumption was that it made no difference to people if it was in or out. However, I have recently been asked to recommence, hence I will give it another go.

Perhaps the most contentious issue Council has addressed recently has been the Development Approval for the Duck's Nuts Motorbike Park in Popanyinning. The Park has been operating for some time with a limit of 10 rider however the business was being severely restricted by the original approval as demand for the Park continued to grow. As with all things in Local Government there is a process we needed to follow which inevitably becomes frustrating to some, if not all, before it is concluded.

The application was lodged in mid 2016 and public comment period opened shortly after with the full range of opinions expressed from concerned neighbours to enthusiastic users and supporters of the facility. Through the process it became apparent noise was the issue of most concern and the most difficult to determine. Workable solutions seemed possible for issues including traffic, fire management, sanitation and emergency services access, but noise was subjective dependant if you were supportive or opposed to the Park. Council originally deferred a decision on the application until the applicant provided with an independent, professional noise assessment. Without such a noise assessment, Council decided to refuse the application in February 2017.

Following that decision, the applicants exercised their right to refer the matter to the State Arbitration Tribunal (SAT) for determination. SAT has a reputation for overturning Council decisions. After attending a SAT mediation session in Perth with Council, the applicant engaged a professional noise consultant to complete an independent noise assessment. The results of that assessment indicated that noise levels at the nearest residence complied with the Department of Environmental Regulation requirements but exceeded noise limits at one section of the northwest boundary of the Motorbike Park. One of the more interesting findings of the report was that it was not the number of bikes that contributed to the noise level but the loudest bike determined noise impact. SAT then directed the Council to reconsider the application.

Therefore in June 2017, Council reconsidered the application and approved the Development Application with several conditions, including moving the northwest track away from the boundary fence to comply with all noise regulations. These conditions imposed by Council were also referred to the SAT by the applicant. However the applicant has complied with all of Council conditions and withdrawn their appeal to SAT. .

Although the above explanation of events is unlikely to change anyone's opinion, I hope it shows that Council has been extremely diligent throughout the process and have not stumbled into a decision lightly. The Shire role now shifts to compliance and ensuring all conditions of the approval are being met continually.

Horses on Roads

The Shire has recently received a complaint from a local resident about horse manure on town roads and paths. The horse manure is an issue for other path users and nearby home owners.

While horses are able to use Shire of Cuballing roads without restriction, riders using roads and paths are encouraged to remove any manure left behind.

While the Shire of Cuballing does not have a local law restricting horse owners or the manure of their horses, other local governments certainly do. Shire staff are investigating the possibility of such a local law.

Council Shorts

The Popanyinning Bush Fire Brigade has taken delivery of a new light tanker fire appliance. This fire unit is fully funded by the ESL levy paid on Shire rates. Last month a heavy tanker was also provided for the Cuballing Bush Fire Brigade.

The Cuballing Fire Station has been approved for a \$70,000 upgrade to add toilets to the building. This upgrade is funded through the ESL levy capital grant.

Local residents who wish to stand for the position of Councillor in the Shire of Cuballing must nominate between before 4pm, 14th September 2017. The Council election will be held on Saturday 21st October 2017.

Council received a reduction of road funding of \$42,367 as part of the State Governments recent \$10.2 million statewide reduction of Direct Grants to all local governments. Direct Grants are untied grants that Council's are able to expend on any road. The State Government reduced the funding as part of their budget repair program.

At their August Ordinary Meeting, the Council:

- Agreed to change over the rubber tired road roller for a price of \$125,000. Council selected the Bomag BW27RH offered by Tutt Bryant Equipment from the 3 rollers offered. The Bomag roller replaces an Amman roller purchased in 2008.
- supported legal action to recover unpaid rates on a Cuballing property that has not paid Council rates for 3 years.

Admissions are anticipated to commence in November 2017



WA Cat Act 2011

If your cat has reached six months of age they must be:

- microchipped
- sterilised, and
- registered with your local government.

You can be fined up to \$5,000 for each requirement if they are not carried out unless:

- the cat belongs to a class of cats prescribed as exempt from registration
- the cat has not been registered as it is within 14 days of you either just moving to WA or just starting keeping the cat, or
- the cat is exempt from sterilisation or microchipping.

You must register your cat within 14 days if you have just moved to WA or just started keeping your cat to avoid being fined.

To be a cat owner you must be over 18 years of age. If you are under 18 years of age the cat must be registered under the name of one of your parents or your guardian.

Your cat also has to wear a collar and registration tag in a public place to make sure that your cat can be easily identified and returned to you. You can be fined up to \$5,000 if your cat is not wearing its registration tag in a public place and it is not exempt from this requirement.

What are the exemptions to the sterilisation of cats?

Your cat does not have to be sterilised if :

- a veterinarian has given a certificate stating that to sterilise your cat may adversely affect its health and welfare
- you are an approved cat breeder and you have the cat for the purpose of breeding, or
- the cat belongs to a class of cats prescribed as exempt from sterilisation.

What are the exemptions to the microchipping of cats?

Your cat does not have to be microchipped if a veterinarian has given a certificate stating that to implant a microchip in your cat may adversely affect the health and welfare of your cat. This certificate does not apply if your cat is under six months of age.

What about the costs involved if I am a pensioner or on a low income?

If you are a pensioner you will receive a discount with local governments on registration fees.


The WA Government has also provided funding to help provide low cost sterilisation for cats owned by pensioners and people on low incomes Department of Local Government and Communities can provide advice.

How do I register my cat?

To register your cat you will need to apply to your local government. A fee is payable.

What if I want to breed cats?

All cat breeders have to be approved by your local government even to breed one litter. Contact your local government to get an application form.

Cuballing War Memorial Stephen Bowes Private Alfred George Barr

A visit to the Cuballing War Memorial, on the corner of Alton and Campbell Streets, is a rewarding, illuminating, reflective experience.

Consider for a few moments of your time, how much of themselves these men, whose names adorn the granite slabs, gave in service, and too often in sacrifice, for a greater good. This was the Cuballing of one hundred years ago.

The inscription "G Barr" commemorates Private Alfred George Barr, regimental number 5050, of the 48th Battalion AIF.

George Barr was an Englishman born at Paddington, London. He came to Australia as a nineteen year old, leaving his widower father, Alfred, in England.

George was a district messenger in England, a lumberer, adept at felling trees. After arriving in Western Australia, he took up farm work in the Cuballing district. It may be significant that "Mrs Senior, Hill Crest, Cuballing" was given as his referee, but in reality, we know little of his life here, or in Britain.

In January, 1916, George was moved to enlist to serve with the Australian Imperial Force in the Great War. Dr DWH Mackie performed the medical examination in Narrogin, recording a man who stated his age to be 27 years and 11 months, but was actually 23. He was five feet nine inches tall, with ruddy complexion, blue eyes and fair hair.

George gave his religion as Atheist, which was unusual for the time. When asked for a sample of his handwriting, he chose to write in freehand: "I am going for the sake of Australia". George Barr took his oath of allegiance on February 10 at Black Boy Hill and was appointed to the 16th Reinforcements, 16th Battalion, which sailed from Fremantle on 31/3/16 aboard HMAT Shropshire A9.

Arriving in Egypt in early April, he went into camp at Zeitoun.



Community comes together for planting morning

Recently 70 volunteers, including staff, students and parents from Boddington District High School, South32 Worsley Alumina, Newmont Boddington Gold, Friends of the Reserves – Boddington (Inc.) and the Shire of Boddington joined Mel and Kate from PHCC in a tree planting event in Blue Gum Park (Boddington). Tunbridge Gully flows through Blue Gum park and is very degraded and infested with the invasive weed *Juncus acutus* (Spiny Rush) in this area.

The morning event saw 400 local native seedlings planted along the creekline to assist with soil stabilisation and weed control. It was a great morning which finished off with a sausage sizzle catered by the Boddington Lions Club. This project is part of the larger Tunbridge Gully Restoration project which is supported by PHCC through funding from South32 Worsley Alumina and the Australian Government's National Landcare Programme.

A PHCC Community Environment Grant has enabled Trish and Robert Bowden of "Warren Hill" to fence off part of their farm's creek system to restrict stock access and protect the creek area.

Emu War of 1932

It all came about in November 1932, after a marauding emu population of at least 20,000 had been devastating farms across WA for some time. The farmers under attack (many of them ex-soldiers themselves) had eventually petitioned for military aid from the Minister of Defence George Pearce. He deployed troops swiftly, and they arrived with hopes of quick victory and a few emu feathers for their hats.

No sooner had the conflict begun, however, than it became clear that the Australian military had vastly underestimated the emu. Cunning adversaries, the emus proved almost impossible to hit with machine-gun fire, and they seemed able to shrug off even serious injury from bullets without breaking stride.

Describing the emus, Major Meredith later said:

“If we had a military division with the bullet-carrying capacity of these birds it would face any army in the world... They can face machine guns with the invulnerability of tanks.”

A few days into operations, a planned ambush by a dam failed miserably when one of the Lewis guns jammed. A later attempt to mount a machine-gun on a truck fell apart when it was made apparent that the vehicle could not keep up with the birds.

Within a week of first contact the troops were recalled. Roughly 2500 rounds had been fired and killed somewhere between 50 and 200 emus. Meredith did note that his men had suffered no casualties. When the question was raised if a medal would be struck for the conflict, federal labor parliamentarian A.E. Green replied that any medals should go to the emus who had ‘won every round so far’. For his involvement in the deployment, Defence Minister George Pearce earned the unofficial title ‘Minister for the Emu War’.

Although a second (slightly) more successful military operation was mounted against the emus only a few days after the initial retreat in November 1932, in the end it was the instituting of a bounty on emus that proved most effective. Between 1945 and 1960 around 284,700 emus were killed in WA.

Australia’s emu population, however, remains stable to this day. Thankfully, they do not seem interested in resuming hostilities with the Australian government.




His Majesty's Transport ship *Huntspill* steamed out of Alexandria on June 7, with reinforcement troops including George Barr,

reaching Marseilles a week later. He was 'taken on strength' of the 48th Battalion in the field in France on July 21, 1916.

The First Battle of the Somme commenced at 7.30 am on Saturday, the first day of July, 1916, when British and French forces sought to drive into entrenched German defences, which had proven immovable for nearly two years. By the end of July, at the cost of horrendous casualties, limited gains had been made.

Following the introduction of the AIF to the Somme in the middle of July, these gains included the village of Pozieres, captured by the First Australian Division.

As actions continued to dislodge the Germans from a ridge extending to the north of Pozieres, the 48th Battalion was tasked with holding "at all costs" trenches recently won from the enemy. In doing so, they were subjected to an enemy artillery bombardment of a continuity, concentration and intensity that drove men to insanity. Quoting the fine prose of W. Devine in his history of the 48th, 'The Story of a Battalion': "All through the night of the 5th, all through the 6th it lasted, a great impersonal horror, until noon on the 7th, when it abated so suddenly that one felt as if the world had just been freed from the influence of some foul and

demonic oppression".

George Barr was Killed in Action at Pozieres, France on August 6, 1916. He was a single man, 24 years old. Sadly, like tens of thousands of men lost on the Western Front, he has no known grave, and is so commemorated on the Australian Memorial at Villers Brettoneux, in the Somme Valley.

His personal possessions were returned to his father Alfred in three packages. One contained a photo and cards; another held a watch (damaged) in a case, a purse containing fifteen coins, a clasp knife, five badges and a belt; the third enclosed George's identity disc, two coins and a metal religious medallion (unusual for an atheist).

Sparrows are just one of a number of declared pests which have established in other Australian states except Western Australia, thanks to the eager eyes of our community members. Pest birds such as sparrows, starlings, blackbirds, house crows, the Indian myna and Indian ringneck parakeets posed a significant threat, as they are known to damage a range of crops and compete with native birds.

Sparrows are easily identified by the way they hop around and would be attracted to backyard bird feeding sites, cafes, aviaries and grain storage facilities.

“They are brown or dark grey with a streaked back and a wedge-shaped beak, between 11 and 16 centimeters long and look similar to some finches, but are

slightly chubbier.

Any unusual birds seen in the wild should be reported to the department’s Pest and Disease Information Service (PADIS) on 9368 3080 or by using MyPestGuide app now available on the Google Play Store and Apple iTunes Store.


