

Draft Camping on Council Property Policy — Public Comment

Council is considering adopting a policy to deal with the issue of camping on Council Property. Council is seeking public comment on a Draft Camping on Council Property Policy prior to a decision at the May 2018 Council Meeting.

The Draft Policy currently would allow:

- 1 camping for one night, for no charge, for self contained caravans and campers, at Popanyinning opposite the Popanyinning Store and at Cuballing opposite the Cuballing Roadhouse.
- 2 camping with a permit at Yornaning Dam for up to 3 nights.
- 3 camping at Shire properties including the Cuballing Recreation Ground, Popanyinning Recreation Ground and Popanyinning School for up to 3 nights. It is expected that such camping would be associated with community or special events.

Council would impose a fee for camping at Yornaning Dam and other Shire properties.

Comments on the proposal may be submitted to the Shire of Cuballing in writing on or before the Friday 4th May 2018.

DRAFT CAMPING ON COUNCIL PROPERTY POLICY

Camping on Council Property Without a Permit

Council will allow camping without a permit in the following areas:

- 1. An area of the railway reserve in the Popanyinning townsite bounded by the public toilets, water standpipe, residence at 145 Francis Street and Railway line.
- 2. The car park area of the railway reserve in the Cuballing townsite bounded by the old machinery display shed, railway, recreational vehicle sewerage disposal point and water pipe-line.

Camping in these areas, without a permit is conditional upon:

- Camping is only permitted in the defined area;
- Camping is only permitted for a one consecutive night;
- Camping is only permitted between the hours of 4pm and 9am;
- Camping is only permitted in a self-contained, camping trailer, caravan or motor home, manufactured for the purpose of camping. Self-contained means having adequate toilet facilities built into the camping trailer, caravan or motor home.
- No camp fires of any type are permitted at any time.

Council will not charge a fee for this Camping

DRAFT CAMPING ON COUNCIL PROPERTY POLICY - continued

Camping at Yornaning Dam With a Permit

Council will allow camping with a permit at Yornaning Dam Reserve.

Camping in this area, with a permit, is conditional 7. upon:

- 1. Obtaining a permit prior to establishing a campsite;
- 2. Camping can only be permitted for up to 3 basis, with prior notice of at least a month consecutive nights. Council may consider applications for extended
- 3. periods on an individual basis, with prior notice of at least a month;
- 3. Camping is only permitted in a swag, tent, camping trailer, caravan or motor home, manufactured for the purpose of camping;
- 4. Camp fires strictly prohibited from 1 November to 1 March.
- 5. Camp fires permitted with a permit to burn from Shire of Cuballing Bush Fire Brigade from 1 October to 31 October and from 2 March to 19 April.
- 6. Council may close campsite when weather conditions require;
- 7. Payment of the Council fee for camping on Shire of Cuballing property.
- 8. Mobile power generators external to the vehicle should only be used up to two hours to top-up internal batteries and not operating before 7am or after 9pm.
- 9 Externally strung washing lines are not permitted.
- 10 If dogs accompany campers the Dog Act 1976 and the Shire of Cuballing Dog Local Law applies.

- Rubbish disposal or waste management;
- Times when noise should be minimised;

- Camping can only be permitted for up to 3 six consecutive nights. Council may consider applications for extended
- periods on an individual basis, with prior notice of at least a month:
- Camping is only permitted in a swag, tent, camping trailer, caravan or motor home, manufactured for the purpose of camping;
- Camp fires may be permitted with specific approval. Applications should indicate the request for approval of a camp fire with the permit application. Shire staff may seek the opinion of Shire of Cuballing Bush Fire Brigade volunteers in
- considering a request for a camp fire;
- Payment of the Council fee for camping on Shire of Cuballing property.
- Mobile power generators external to the vehicle should only be used up to two hours to top-up internal batteries and not operating before 7am or after 9pm.
- Externally strung washing lines are not permitted.
- If dogs accompany campers the Dog Act 1976 and the Shire of Cuballing Dog Local Law applies.

Council staff are encouraged to include additional conditions on each permit to camp on Shire property Limiting numbers to the environmental capacity of that addresses factors unique to each location such as:

- Rubbish disposal or waste management;
- Parking or driving on areas of the property;
- Times when noise should be minimised;
- Use of the Shire buildings or facilities on the property.

Purchase of Gravel Pit

Council has agreed to purchase 19 hectares of nonarable, private land on Shaddicks Road, East Popanyinning for \$37,095.

Council has plans to extract the estimated 69,000 m3 of gravel for use on local roads in the area. This gravel is ideally located for Council staff to cart gravel to road east of Popanyinning. Gravel from this pit was used in the recent works on Popanyinning East and Kerruish Roads.

Council staff applied for a clearing permit to clear 0.8 hectares of roadside vegetation in March 2017.

This permit was granted in November 2017 but was appealed shortly after. The appeal has yet to be finalised.

Council has applied to bring forward a portion of the approved 2018/19 works on Wandering Narrogin and Stratherne Roads into the 2017/18 financial year. The amount of work request to be brought forward would be equal to the amount of 2017/18 works that will not be completed.

The increased difficulty in obtain permits to clear vegetation is likely to continue. Council staff have applied for permits to clear vegetation for the 2018/19 road widening projects last year and will shortly complete applications for permits to clear vegetation for the 2019/20 road widening projects. Clearing permits are granted for 5 years.

Community Assisted Transport Service - CATS

The Narrogin CATS offers a valuable transport service to people without private transport and who require specialist medical treatment in Bunbury, Busselton, Mandurah and Perth. The service is managed by the Shire of Narrogin and has operated

CATS relies wholly on volunteers as drivers and the vehicle is in use on an average of three days a week with sometimes two or three patients being transported to various hospitals and facilities.

Patients transported by CATS, can access WA Country Health Service's Patient Assisted Travel Scheme (PATS) to contribute towards vehicle operating costs including fuel or privately pay \$75. help support you to access the Farm Household \$15 of this payment can be claimed back from the volunteer drivers for lunch and refreshment

Apart from PATS there is no government support on offer for this highly valued community service. At their March 2018 Meeting Council formally decided to join the Shire of Narrogin and Wagin, Narrogin Revheads, Narrogin Lions Club and the Narrogin & Council has had to modify the 2017/18 road District Senior Citizens in supporting the Narrogin CATS service.

YORNANING DAM REHABILITATION PROJECT

The Shire has commenced the first stage of the 3 install a culvert on the main access to the parking rehabilitation project as part of the grant funding applied for last year and approved in December.

To further explain the project, Shire staff will be onsite on Tuesday 10th April from 10.30am to explain and discuss the project with local residents and ratepayers. If you are unable to attend at this time, I would be happy to try to make alternative arrangements to discuss the project.

The Yornaning Dam Rehabilitation Project looks to:

- 1 Install a ringlock fence to eastern side of the dam 6 Install new signage in and around the Dam reserve to between the dam reserve and CBH and the southern edge of the Yornaning West Road. This fence aims to have people entering the dam reserve use the main entrance.
- 2 install gates in access points other than the main and to allow water to soak in prior to planting later in entrance, to allow access to the dam wall when the year. required;

area;

- 4 install pine bollards around the parking area. The parking area will be reduced in size but we are not trying to make it small. The area on the extremity of the parking area near the bush is becoming denuded of vegetation over time and the bollards are an attempt to keep vehicles in the parking area.
- 5 Replant some areas that are outside the carpark with natives.
- improve and control access.

The first stage started with ripping of the areas identified for replanting. This work has been done now to maximise the breaking up of the compaction of the soil

OUR HERITAGE — ST PETER'S CHURCH

East of 'Ingersley' on Campbell Street is the attractively restored building of St Peter's, the former Anglican Church.

From as early as 1900 local members of the Church of England had pressed for a church to be built. Many letters were exchanged between a church committee headed by Thomas Reynolds, the Lands Department and the diocese of Bunbury, and the hardworking committee set about raising funds. The other members were Mr and Mrs Bousfield, Mr and Mrs Iles and Messrs C. Bridge, J. Lodge, D.P. Murray, C. Aikens and D.H. Robinson.

Official wheels ground slowly, but at last, on 6 October 1906, the Government Land Agent granted the required block of land. He is quoted as saying: *"Cuballing will never be much of a place. Blocks of land are selling for four to six pounds."* The sum of £17 was paid for a 999 year lease of Location 19.

The work of building the church was carried out by Mr Plunket, Mr E.G. Cohen was the architect. All the stone used was quarried and carted by the parishioners, and the bricks were made and kiln fired by the Davey brothers at their brickworks on the eastern outskirts of the township. The foundation stone was laid by Mrs Ada Reynolds on 25 July 1911. At the same time there was then placed in a cavity beneath the foundation stone a glass bottle containing the 'West Australian', 'Great Southern Leader', 'Narrogin Observer', and 'Church Chronicle' and coin of the realm. Nearly three months later, on 15 October, the Bishop of Bunbury consecrated the building, by which time it was free of debt.

There had been great controversy regarding the payment for Mr Plunket's work. He had been behind time and wanted payment in advance. The matter was taken to court, with Plunket suing Mr Reynolds, the Church trustee, for money held back. The battle of payments continued until, in 1913, Thomas Darling and Son also took Reynolds to court. Reynolds counter-sued for £57-1-5 which he claimed the Church owed him. However, this was to no avail for *"no record of same was on the books"*. Mrs Reynolds also pursued the matter, but without success. Finally, because the Reynolds' estate was frozen, she appealed to the Church for financial help.

The Heritage Council of W.A. in 1996 awarded this building Category 3 status for conservation purposes. The Statement of Significance states:- *"The building is a representative example of a simplified interpretation of the Gothic style. The aesthetics of the place are enhanced by the vented roof lantern and the contrasting stonework and brickwork which creates visual interest.*

The place has historic significance as part of a building boom that occurred around 1912, as Cuballing established itself as a progressive town with the facilities to support it.

The walls of the building are coursed random rubble with dressed joints. The walls have brick window surrounds and stepped buttresses. The stonework in the altar wall is not pointed.

The church has a vestry and porch that radiate from the southern end of the building. The vestry and porch also have gabled roofs which are devoid of any decoration. The roof of the nave is adorned with a square roof lantern, with a pyramidal spire, which is located about the altar.

Fenestration is semi-circular arches divided into eight panes. The nave consists of six windows, three either side.

The altar wall has undergone alteration. Photographic evidence dated 1982, shows the altar wall with a bricked-up opening with brick quoin work and lintel still in place."



OUR HISTORY—ST PETER'S CHURCH continued

Among the early clergymen who ministered in the church were Reverands Davis, Kettel, Trevor and Burbridge, Canon Needham and his brother Rev. Richard Needham. Mr Bridge and Mr Stokes often took the evening service. After retiring from farming on 'Wonnaminta' in 1946 Mr Stokes took a great interest in the Anglican

Church of the Resurrection in Narrogin. He became a lay preacher, taking services in Narrogin, Cuballing and Highbury. He became a deacon in 1956. While he and his wife were still on the farm Mrs Stokes used to conduct Sunday School in St Peter's.

The first christening in this beautiful church was for Stanley Bernard Atkins on 24 November 1912, and the first wedding celebrated was that of George Grout and Eleanor Glencross on 19 July 1917.

At first the church flourished, with three services every Sunday in 1911



and an attendance of up to 50 people at each one. However, attendance gradually declined. There were only fortnightly services by 1920 and the building was eventually de-consecrated in mid-1970. This was a very sad state of affairs.

In ensuing years, with the decline of the town, the church fell into disuse and deteriorated badly. Offers for




the building were made, but it was not until 1987 that one from a suitably heritage-minded lawyer was made and accepted. It was then discovered that the church had been erected half on Lot 19 and half on Reserve 6725. There followed more frustrating delays while this matter was sorted out. Eventually, Mrs Lyn Carroll was given final approval to purchase the building and land, now lots 245 and 451.

Mrs Carroll proceeded gently and gradually with the extensive renovations, so that now the old

church is a building of peace, light and love, done in exceptionally good taste. The historical value has been retained and the lead lighting of the windows adds charm to the rooms. It has become a very comfortable home with a fine spiritual atmosphere. The grounds are also a delight to behold. Lyn Carroll, in recent years, has rented St Peter's out and spent her time working with church missions in South Pacific Islands and in Africa. She has indeed been a 'hands-on' helper of humanity in very deprived areas where she has worked at 'grass-roots' level.

Ms Carroll has since sold the church and is continuing her way down at Molloy Island, Good Luck Lyn

The project aims to maintain and build a sustainable woylie and numbat populations in the iconic woodland by providing landholders assistance with feral animal control. Farmers were provided the opportunity to loan free cage traps and Mike Clark from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) spoke on 1080 accreditation and baiting and offered the training and assessment on the day.

Farmers who were unable to attend will be malled information packs. PHCC is pleased to partner with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) and Project Numbat on this project.





New Partnership to Deliver in Hotham-Williams

PHCC is pleased to be partnering with Newmont Boddington Gold to assist with the delivery of NRM activities across the Hotham-Williams subcatchment over the next 5 years.

The community investment agreement entitled "The Hotham-Williams Rivers & Tributaries' Natural Resource Management and Conservation Project" aims to commission a multifaceted study of the Hotham and Williams Rivers that will inform NRM planning and action, increase biosecurity focussed activities, develop and deliver landowner grant programs and build community capacity for future land management.

A launch of the partnership is planned to occur in the coming months.

Narrow leaf cotton bush (Gomphocarpus fruticosus) is a declared pest in Western Australia (WA).

Cotton bush invades pastures and can form dense thickets many hectares in size. It is toxic to livestock.

Its current legal status is Declared Pest - s22(2) Category C3 which requires action to be taken. 


