

Extension of Restricted Burning Period

It is hereby advised that in accordance with Section 18(5)(a)(i) of the Bush Fires Act (1954) the commencement of the Restricted Burning Period for the Shire of Cuballing has been extended from 1st October 2021 to now commence on Thursday 14th October 2021.

FIREBREAK REQUIREMENTS

TOWNSITES AND RURAL RESIDENTIAL LAND

All town lots under $2,024m^2$ (1/2 acre) in area and all fuel depots within the Shire are required to be cleared of all debris and flammable material to a height not more than 50mm.

All lots or combination of lots that comprise of one holding and having an area of 2,024m² (1/2 acre) or greater shall be either clear of all inflammable material or have a firebreak 2.5 metres wide free of all inflammable material provided inside and along all external boundaries.

RURAL LANDS

Firebreak not less than 2.5 metres wide must be established along, inside and within 20 metres of the external boundary of each property (i.e. cleared/part cleared or uncleared land) and where the boundary is adjacent to or adjoins a used gazetted road.

In the interest of protection from soil erosion, firebreaks may be established on the land contours but only with prior approval of the Council or its duly authorised officer.

An area 4 metres wide cleared of all flammable material shall be established immediately around the perimeter of all homesteads, buildings, haystacks and fuel storage areas.

Shire of Cuballing All Purpose Access

As part of the 2021/22 budget the Shire of Cuballing allocated \$62,833 to construct an all purpose access to the administration building.

The works included the construction of an all purpose ramp that leads to automatic entry doors. The old front doors were removed and the space bricked up and rendered. A covered area was installed over the new entry to protect visitors from the elements when entering the Shire office.



The Shire was successful in obtaining a grant to fund the new access from the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

The new access was constructed by Cuballing Building Company using business's from the local area including, Ike's Glass, BKS Electrical and A & A Corasaniti.

The Shire staff would like to thank the contractors who all worked tirelessly to finish the project with a minimum of disruption to Shire operations, with a huge thanks to David Shanks for co-ordinating the construction with military precision.

Now the all purpose access is complete, the second stage of the project is in full swing. This involves a refurbishment of the reception area, front gardens and parking areas.

Cotton Bush Control Worth The Effort

Narrow-leaved Cotton Bush is a Declared Weed and has a significant impact of farm production and animal health.

This time of the year pods are forming on this small shrub, with the potential for thousands of air-bore seeds moving onto surrounding land.

Finding Cotton Bush infestation now and scheduling control (physical or chemical) will reduce the chance of this weed establishing on your property.

Cotton bush invades pastures and can form dense thickets many hectares in size if left uncontrolled. It is toxic to livestock and although rarely eaten can be fatal if it is.

Areas with mature infestations of cotton bush can be permanently unavailable for agriculture, costly to remove and become a reservoir evaluation of other projects.

CEG Updates... 2021/2022 Community

Environment Grant Applications have now been presented to the assessment panel to be reviewed on their merits against criteria to meet Australian Governmnet outcomes, for access to a limited pool of funds.

There were a total of 41 applications across the Peel-Harvey Catchment with 25 of these being for projects within the Hotham-Williams Sub-catchment.

Applicants will soon be notified if their project was successful.

The PHCC team have also been out and about visiting CEG projects from 2020/2021.

Potential Risk to Carnaby's

Mouse numbers are forecast to reach plague proportions in some parts of WA.

As you may have seen on the ABC recently to minimise mouse impacts some landholders are turning to broadscale aerial spread posioned grain (treated with a first generation rodenticide with zinc phosphide).

Although we've been advised the risks of secondary posioning are low, direct ingestion of treated grain could cause ill effects for birds. Carnaby's are known to feed on canola both before and after harvesting, feeding on the ground, leaving them open to risk of direct ingestion.

Please be vigilant and if you do see any sick or dead Carnaby's report to Perth Zoo (9474 0444) or BirdLife (9383 7749) ASAP.

Hotham River Highest July Streamflow in 20 years

Wow, that was a wet winter! In fact, this July was the wettest month since 2016, with rainfall 7% above the 1961-1990 July average for Western Australia as a whole, according to the Bureau of Meteorology.

A rainfall and streamflow summary issued by the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation stated that the Hotham River had its highest recorded streamflow for July in over 20 years.

Red-Tailed Phascogale Nest Boxes

Recently PHCC team members conducted monitoring of 8 redtailed phascogale nest boxes, these are located in Dryandra Woodland, East Yornaning Reserve and on private property.

Although we didn't see any redtailed phascogales, we did see a small amount of nesting material which has given us hope for next year.

Excitingly we have also been receiving several reports from landholders who have seen both red-tailed and brush-tailed phascogales on their properties.

An open letter to the Cuballing community

It has been an honour and a privilege to serve as a Councillor on the Shire of Cuballing for the last two years. It has been challenging to represent such a diverse community, but I have enjoyed every minute of it. Having the chance to work with people, both elected to, and employed by, council has been an exciting experience. Meeting the challenges of serving on such a small council, within the demanding parameters of legislative requirements, whilst balancing a budget that will never meet all of the community demands, places huge responsibilities onto the shoulders of the staff who prepare the information required to make these decisions, Councillors who have to prioritise the projects and the staff who make them happen.

My greatest regret is that I am unable to complete my term, due to the medical diagnosis of pancreatic cancer. As my treatment is scheduled to continue for at least 6 months, remaining as an elected member became an impossible task. I need to concentrate all of my energies and positivity into my recovery. This condition was certainly unexpected and has put many future plans on hold.

The cancer is localised in the pancreas, and there has been no metastisation into other areas of my body. I have chemotherapy infusions every fortnight, at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital, and am spending most of my time being cared for, by friends, in Shenton Park.

Barry is caring for the farm, and I get to spend a few days per chemo round, chilling out under the huge sky of Popanyinning – what a wonderful place for mindful healing. Without his love and support, I would not be able to throw myself wholeheartedly into the healing process.

Please accept our thanks for the kinds words and actions given to us by council and the community.

I wish all of the candidates the very best for the upcoming election and look forward to the being present to swear in the new council on Wednesday 20th October.

INTO THE GARDEN — by Peter Denton

THE SANTALUM TRIO"

Growing in our regional bushlands are three santalum species; the sweet quandong, [santalum acuminatum] Australian sandalwood [santalum spicatum] and the bitter quandong [santalum murrayanum].

All three are unique plants as they are semi parasitic, their root systems "tap into" the root systems of a range of other plants the favoured ones being acacias which are nitrogen fixers. Around the Great Southern Acacia acuminata [Raspberry jam tree] is a common host tree.

The quandongs are generally standalone after 4-5 years; whereas the sandalwood favours a longer term relationship with its host. All of the three generally set fruit from an age of approximately 4-5 years. The quandong and sandalwood nuts are a favoured food of the emu and the woylie; which has an unusual habit of burying quandong nuts squirrel like I guess, as a snack for later. A common pollinator of the santalum tree is the Australian woodwhite butterfly [Delias aganippe]

The sweet quandong fruit is edible, high in vitamin C, making great jam, chutney and quandong pie of course. The sandalwood nuts are edible too and are marketed as a snack food.

The bitter quandong; is just that, bitter! But has its role in the bush being eaten by emus, woylies and bush rats.

All three make a great garden plant too, they host off other garden plants without affecting them.
