

Native Plant of the Month

Peter Denton, Cuballing

The eremophila group of native plants are stunning hardy plants to say the least.

Eremophila maculata

"Silver"

Eremophila maculata silver bears 25mm silver blue flowers with purple spots, almost fuschia like. The bush grows to $1.5m \times 1.5m$, flowering in Spring to early Summer. A very hardy plant, tolerating frost, drought and from light to heavy soils. The maculata group of eremophilas also come in red, a stunning purple, yellow and sometimes white flowers.

Similar as with grevilleas, eremophilas are great bird and insect attracting plants bringing native hover flies, small wasps, native bees and butterflies to your garden.

Eremophilas grow in varied environments throughout Australia, in excess of 500 species from the red deserts to cooler coastal areas, many endemic to Western Australia with South Australia the main winners.

Other Eremophilas of our region include Eremophila decipiens, glabra, veneta, nivea and racemosa. [All available from Chedoona Gallery and Nursery Cuballing.]



Motorbike Park Application Refused

A planning application submitted by the Ducks Nuts Motorbike Park to increase the operation of the Park to 60 bikes was refused by Council at the March Ordinary Council Meeting.

In making their decision, Council cited that the application had not sufficiently demonstrated, through a noise assessment by a suitably qualified acoustic consultant, that predicted noise levels from the proposed expanded operations would comply with the Environmental Protection Act 1986 and the Environmental Protection Noise Regulations 1997.

Council had initially considered the application at their October 2016 Ordinary Council Meeting where they had sought further information from the Ducks Nuts Motorbike Park including:

- an improved site plan/s,
- provision of certificates of insurance,
- a dust suppression plan,
- a noise assessment by a suitably qualified acoustic consultant, that outlined noise levels from existing operations, predicted noise levels from proposed operations and possible noise mitigation measures;
- a dust suppression plan; and
- a management plan which addressed matters including managing clients, minimising risks, promoting safety and being a good neighbour,

Since October, the Ducks Nuts Motorbike Park had provided Council with additional information that had addressed all matters except the noise assessment.

While this application was refused, the Ducks Nuts Motorbike Park can still operate within the limits of the Council approval granted in 2014.



PHCC Continues Fight Against Feral Rabbits

PHCC has worked with the Shire of Cuballing and Serpentine Jarrahdale to release the RHDV-K5 rabbit haemorrhagic disease virus during the first week of March.

Virus release has also been undertaken in Boddington, by the Shire of Boddington, and in Williams via a private landholder, who applied as an initial release site.

PHCC is supporting the Department of Agriculture and Food WA in the initial release, which will also involve assessment of current rabbit numbers, ongoing monitoring of release sites, and the coordinated release of the virus to monitor changes in rabbit populations.

The release has coincided with an awareness campaign with pet rabbit owners, to ensure their furry friend is vaccinated prior to the release of this new virus strain.

Great Cocky Count draws Williams Community

Williams gathered for an information session about the Great Cocky Count on 28 February, hosted by PHCC. Birdlife Australia presented on the three Black Cockatoo Species, and highlighted the importance of the Count, to help understand the number of species and their distribution across the State.



Cuballing War Memorial Private Derek Charles Freeman-Smith

After the Armistice of 1918, after the Peace Conference of 1919, and after the men and women of the First Australian Imperial Force had returned to Australia, Miss Honour Bushby of Rose Dale wrote a letter to Base Records, Victoria Barracks, Melbourne requesting photographs of the graves of three Cuballing men.

These were: Bertram Foord, Derek Freeman-Smith, and her eldest brother, Jim Bushby.

On our last visit to the Cuballing Roll of Honour, we paid tribute to the service and sacrifice of Bertram Foord, as we did Jim Bushby on an earlier visit. This piece of ephemera, a letter, reveals that all three men were significant in the life of Miss Honour Bushby.

Derek Charles Freeman-Smith was barely a man when he applied to enlist on 11/4/1917 at Fremantle, and took his Oath of Allegiance. His medical examination revealed a strapping youth 5 feet 10 1/2 inches tall, weighing 140 pounds, with blue eyes, brown hair and a fresh complexion. He declared that he was Church of England and that he was one month past his 18th birthday.

He was born at Gravesend on the Thames estuary, in the county of Kent, and had come to Australia from England as a 7 year old. He attended Fremantle Boys School, serving twelve months in the school cadets. His father's address was Goldsmith Road Claremont, a property with the rather English name 'Cotswold'.

After he had finished school, he sought work in farming at Cuballing and gave his spare time as Scout

Master of the Cuballing Troop.

Derek was assigned, as Private 7720 to the 26th Reinforcements of the 11th Battalion, which steamed out of Fremantle on the Borda (His Majesty's Australian Transport A30) on 29/6/1917.

The fresh contingent of troops disembarked at Plymouth on August 25. In January, they marched out of Sutton Veny and left English shores at Southampton bound for France. Derek was taken on strength of the 11th Battalion in the field on January 31, 1918. On June 3, he suffered a gun shot wound to the left leg. The 3rd Australian Field Ambulance transferred Derek to the 2nd Casualty Clearing Station for treatment to his wounds. He recovered well, was discharged, and re-joined the battalion on June 25.

In early July, the 11th Battalion in northern France were pulled

back from the front line for a weeks rest at La Kreule, one mile from Hazebrouck. This was, no doubt, a welcome relief from life in the trenches. The Third Brigade was paraded for General Birdwood, who presented medals and ribbons to those of the 11th Battalion who had distinguished themselves in the field. The weeks rest also allowed for sports, such as cricket and baseball (in deference to American troops now attached to the Australian brigade). The 11th Battalion moved back to frontline duties near Strazeele on July 13th, relieving the 6th Battalion. Derek Freeman-Smith's final moments were recorded in the precise, blunt words of Lieutenant L Evans of the 11th Battalion: "The abovenamed soldier was killed instantaneously on the Merris Sector on 19/7/18 being shot through the head by an enemy sniper. He was buried in the Military Cemetery Borre France." For the record, Borre is a pretty village in northern France, 3 km east of Hazebrouck, containing many burials from the Australian First actions Division's in 1918.

After the War, in completing the questionnaire circular for the Roll of Honour, Derek's father, Charles declared that his son had been 18 years and 363 days old on the day he died, in other words,

two days short of his 19th birthday. Clearly, Derek had elevated his age to enlist, by a few months. If dealing with bureaucratic demands were not enough for a grieving father, the length of his son's name, Derek Charles Freeman-Smith, was posing a problem. The standard CWGC headstone could accommodate only 22 characters in the name (counting spaces and symbols). The headstone in Borre Military Cemetery today bears the name (with no hyphen in keeping with his father's directive) 7720 Private Derek Freeman 11th Smith. Battalion Australian Infantry, 19th July 1918, 18 years. The grieving parents, Charles and Lydia Elizabeth Susannah Freeman-Smith, added to Derek's headstone a biblical quote from The Sermon on the Mount: Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God.

And what of Miss Honour Bushby, and her letter to AIF Base Records? The Military authorities dutifully provided grave photographs for the three men after whom she so earnestly enquired, and answered her questions about how and where they died, as best they could.

Before her brother went in to his final action, perhaps guessing that the battle would be costly, Jim Bushby gave his most valued possessions, including a photo of Honour, to his best mate, Stan Hamp. OUR NEW RANGE OF SERVICES INCLUDE:



Once upon a time

In the mid-1900s, a Melbourne engineering family. A.W. Chamberlain and sons A.H. and H.W.F. Chamberlain, had a dream: "to produce a tractor entirely suited to the large land holdings of Australian farmers."

The family's dream began to come true in 1947 when a large munitions factory at Welshpool, a suburb of Perth, became available for use by private industry.

The government offered the use of the factory to the Chamberlain family who set up Chamberlain Industries Pty Ltd to manufacture and market agricultural tractors and implements. In 1949, the first Chamberlain tractor rolled off the assembly line at Welshpool.

The famous Chamberlain tractor

The first Chamberlain tractors produced were 40k models of 40 horsepower with twin-cylinder, horizontally opposed engines. They weighed about four tonnes and were ideal for the needs of Australian farmers of that era

In 1952, the family began producing implements with the all-welded Chamberlain scarifier, followed a year later by the first Chamberlain disk plough. The need specialised seeding equipment saw the introduction of the Chamberlain combine seeder in 1963. In 1955 the kerosene tractors gave way to the diesel models.

Services

Onward and upward, until...

Chamberlain products were commanding wide acceptance in Australian farming and export markets, culminating in the 1964 Export Award. To meet the rapidly increasing demands for product, a comprehensive expansion and refit plan was undertaken in 1978.

The Welshpool manufacturing site had been completely redeveloped and a new office complex built by the end of 1982. The rural downturn of the 80s significantly reduced the farm equipment market and, in 1986, the manufacture of the famous Chamberlain tractors ceased.

After the War, this comrade in arms travelled to Cuballing from his home in South Australia to return Jim Bushby's private belongings to his family, and to comfort them in their loss. He proposed marriage to Honour Bushby. In 1928, Mrs Honour Hamp (nee Bushby), pictured 3rd from the right standing, was still an active letter writer to Base Records, and was resident

at 'Boringer', Box 23, Watervale, South Australia.

LEST WE FORGET

Stephen Bowes has done many hours of research in to the names on both the Popo and Cuby Honour Rolls for those who lost their lives in WW1.

Selenium deficiency in stock

Selenium is a trace mineral found naturally in the soil. It appears in certain foods and there are even small amounts in water. For humans, selenium is a vital mineral to increase immunity, protect cells from free radical damage and inflammation, and support a healthy metabolism and fertility. It is also essential for your farm stock, particularly sheep and cattle.

In ruminants including sheep and cattle and even horses, selenium works together with vitamin E to:

• Prevent and repair cell damage by neutralising toxic substances produced by the cells during metabolism, via antioxidant properties

· Support immune and thyroid function,

- · Help supply oxygen to muscles, and
- · Assist with growth and fertility.

As well as supporting these normal functions for health and growth, an adequate amount of selenium in their diet helps prevent diseases and disorders such as white muscle disease, mastitis and calf scours. Where does selenium come from?

While humans get our selenium from natural food sources including Brazil nuts, eggs, liver, tuna, cod, and sunflower seeds, poultry and certain types of meat; sheep and cattle receive their dose from the plants they graze on.

Selenium is found in the soil and taken up by plants at different levels. The uptake depends on factors such as plant variety, rainfall levels and fertiliser application. When ruminants consume selenium from plants it is stored for a short period in the body, mainly in the liver, before being flushed out in normal waste. A continual dietary supply ensures the best possible production.

What happens if sheep and cattle don't get enough?

Selenium deficiency has serious repercussions for your grazing animals. In sheep, it can cause white muscle disease in lambs and weaners scouring, ill thrift, lowered wool production and reduced fertility in ewes.

In cattle, calves can also suffer from white muscle disease, while older cattle can suffer from conditions including cystic ovaries, early and late embryo death, mastitis and retained placenta.

Some factors that can affect selenium levels in the environment include:

• Soil type - sandy, acidic basalt or granite soils are usually low in trace minerals.

• Clover dominant pastures, as clover plants are less efficient in taking up selenium from the soil than grasses.

• Rapid pasture growth in spring which can reduce trace mineral concentration in plants.

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Along with daily home brushing/flossing routine, regular dental checks every 6 months can play an indispensible role in maintaining healthy teeth and gums. Indeed, twice-yearly visits to your dentist can minimise the occurrence of long-term dental problems and deal with immediate issues before they are allowed to develop further.

Regular check-ups can catch the early warning signs of decay or infection, while professional cleaning by a trained clinician helps to get rid of any hard to-remove plaque or tartar.

• High rainfall (over 450mm) which can leach minerals out of the topsoil layer.

• Heavy fertiliser application, particularly sulphur-fortified superphosphate or gypsum fertilisers.

Sheep will also have greater trace mineral requirements at certain times of the year, particularly before joining, when lambing and weaning. Before treating your flock for selenium deficiency, it's important to be sure of the diagnosis. Other elements and nutritional trace deficiencies can also cause poor growth rates and infertility so selfdiagnosing selenium deficiency is not advised. An excess of selenium can be toxic. Accurate diagnosis may require blood samples from at least 10 animals, so it's best to seek your vet's advice before starting a treatment plan.

There are a range of treatments available for selenium deficiency, including in-feed or water-based medication, drenching and injection.
