The recent camping policy decision is a good example where we had perfectly valid but opposing points of view to consider.

The land purchase in Cuballing is another that has divided opinion. Buying land to relocate the Shire storage area and create options to attract new business to our town in the coming years fits perfectly with our strategic plan. A plan based on community consultation and direction. Yet we have divided opinion.

The land offer and acceptance has been signed and will proceed. What is yet to be decided is the land use of the first 2 blocks that the Shire is purchasing immediately north of the current Shire storage yard.

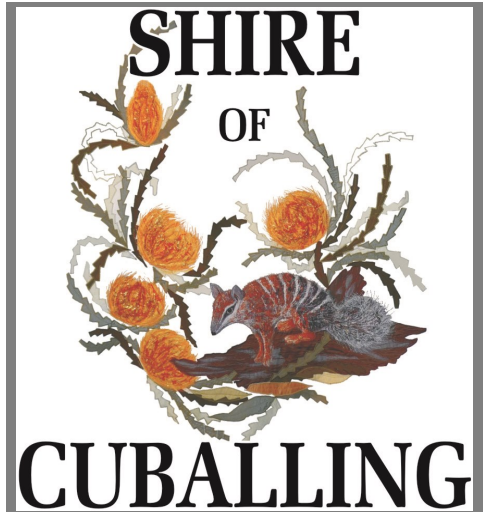
The Shire has prepared a development application outlining the Shire's proposed activity to operate a Shire works storage area for the two lots immediately north from the current operation. This has been advertised to residents in the area as any other application would.

At the June Ordinary Council Meeting, Council will review the application and any public comment received and will accept the proposal or accept the proposal with tight conditions on the activity or reject the application.

Like the camping policy, a Council decision on this development application in the best interest of our community is unlikely to satisfy everyone.

The draft Local Planning Strategy (LPS), when finalised, will be the Council's key strategic land use planning document. The LPS is intended to provide broad direction for the future growth and development of the district for 10 - 15 years.

The draft Local Planning Strategy is currently a preliminary draft and will be modified following comments from the community and other stakeholders in 2018 and based on Western Australian Planning Commission requirements. It is highlighted that investment or associated decisions should not rely on the draft Strategy given the final endorsed Strategy will be different to the preliminary draft version. Please contact the Shire for clarification or for further information.

Written comments are now invited on the draft LPS by 21st June 2018. The draft LPS is available at the Shire office during opening hours along with being available at www.cuballing.wa.gov.au.

Proposed Shire Depot Site at Lot 92 Austral Street & Lot 9 Alton Street

The Shire of Cuballing currently leases 58 Austral Street. This lease will expire on 30 June 2018.

The Shire would like to replicate the current activities on 58 Austral Street on the adjoining portion of 74 Austral Street. The only lots proposed this activity are Lot 92 Austral Street and Lot 9 Alton Street. These lots adjoin the current site on 58 Austral Street.

The proposal is to use Lot 92 Austral Street and Lot 9 Alton Street as a Shire Works Depot including activities of:

- Storage of road building/construction materials. Specifically this includes sand and gravel stockpile and road 10mm and 5mm blue metal;
- Storage of culvert pipes, headwalls and other road building construction materials; and
- Storage of other bulky materials. In the past this has included abandoned vehicles.

The Shire does not intend to access the site every day, but rather when building up stockpiles/unloading materials or delivering stored materials. Normally this activity will include:

- Building up stockpiles of sand and gravel on about a monthly basis. This activity can occur for a whole day;
- Delivering small loads of gravel and sand to local residents and for use for small the Shire's Cuballing town maintenance purposes. This is the most common type of uses and would normally occur on a twice weekly basis for relatively short periods;
- Building up stockpiles of road building materials including blue metal and culvert pipes/headwalls. These activities occur all day for several days each year.
- Deliver of road building materials to road construction projects. These deliveries occur all day, several times in a year.

From time to time unscheduled use of the site will occur for other activities.

Shire access of the site will occur during the Shire of Cuballing's Works Department normal operating hours. The normal hours are week days between 7am and 4.30pm during winter and between 6am and 3.30pm during summer. Some weekend access may be required in an emergency, but this would be for very short periods and not a planned regular activity.

A 1.8 metre high chain link fence will be built around the exterior of Lot 92 Austral Street and Lot 9 Alton Street with 1.8 metre high double gates on entrances from Austral and Alton Streets. Construction of the fencing is expected to cost \$27,550.

Large trees on Lot 92 Austral Street and Lot 9 Alton Street are to be retained where possible.

Vegetation will be removed to provide crossovers. Smaller vegetation will be removed on the site of stockpiles.

Landscaping is proposed at the boundary with Austral and Alton Street. This landscaping will be screening shrubs – bottlebrushes and the like.

COUNCIL UPDATE

CAMPING POLICY

The Shire of Cuballing adopted a policy for camping on Council owned land and reserves at the May Ordinary Council Meeting.

Council has received 14 individual comments regarding the draft Council policy. Of these comments:

- 8 comments were on the same proforma letter, opposing camping at Yornaning Dam and Popanyinning;
- 2 comments supporting free camping and camping outside of Caravan Parks came from outside the Shire of Cuballing;
- 4 comments were generally supportive of free camping and the draft Council policy; and
- 9 people submitted comment opposing camping on Council property and the draft Council policy.

Council also received a petition signed by 17 electors of the Shire of Cuballing opposing free camping in the Shire of Cuballing.

The policy:

- Does not permit camping on the railway reserves in central Popanyinning and Cuballing. While Council supported this, Arc Infrastructure who control the railway reserves were adamant that Camping would not be permitted;
- Free camping at Yornaning Dam by visitors to the Shire is not permitted;
- Allows camping, after obtaining Council permission, at Shire facilities including Cuballing and Popanyinning Recreation Grounds, Cuballing and Popanyinning Halls, Cuballing Golf Club and Yornaning Dam. This type of camping will only be permitted as part of activities conducted by local, non-profit community groups or as part of a local event or activity.

Council will review alternative sites where free camping could be centrally provided in the Cuballing and Popanyinning townsites and will review the Council Camping Policy in two years to determine the impacts of the policy on Council operational cost, visitors and local businesses.

COUNCIL SHORTS

At the May Ordinary Council Meeting:

- Adopted a 10 Year Road Construction Program;
- Increased fees and charges for the provision of building surveying services to local governments and clients from outside the Shire of Cuballing.

LONG VEHICLES – HOWARDS STREET POPANYINNING

Main Roads WA have finally deemed Howard Street in Popanyinning as suitable for RAV 2 – 4 truck access with the following conditions;

- Current written support from the Road Owner, endorsing use of the road, must be obtained, carried in the vehicle and produced upon request; and
- Direct radio contact must be maintained with other restricted access vehicles to establish their position on or near the road (suggested UHF channel 40).

ROAD TRAIN ACCESS TO LOCAL ROADS

The Shire of Cuballing is aware that the permission of the Shire of Cuballing has been a requirement for legal access of Restricted Access Vehicles (RAV) combinations including B doubles and pocket road trains, to a large number of Shire of Cuballing roads. It is a condition on some roads to have the written Shire permission carried in the vehicle.

Accessing a local road, without the required Shire approval, may have financial or legal consequences for the driver and owner of the vehicle.

A list and map of the roads approved for RAV access by main roads and the various conditions for the use of those roads can be obtained from the Main Roads WA website at www.mainroads.wa.gov.au.

Main Roads WA are the responsible authority for setting the conditions of access to Shire of Cuballing roads. When Main Roads WA set the conditions for accessing shire roads they inspect each road.

Where it is safe and sensible to do so, the Shire of Cuballing is seeking to increase the number of approved roads and remove anomalies in the approvals. However currently Main Roads WA have a large back log of inspections and any changes will take some time.

The Shire generally supports the requirement for approval to access Shire roads, because it does restrict the use of Shire roads by contractors and business from outside the Shire to cart exceptionally large amounts of produce through the Shire. The cost of maintaining or repairing roads damaged by traffic without any local economic benefit will be borne by local ratepayers.

Local farmers seeking Shire approval to have their RAV vehicles or the RAV vehicles of their cartage contractors to access the Shire of Cuballing roads should send an email request to the Shire at enquiries@cuballing.wa.gov.au. These approvals for local farmers can normally be provided quickly.

OUR HISTORY— COMMODINE TENNIS CLUB

Our first reunion for 71 years, was a great success.

Approximately 150 people signed our visitors book and were very appreciative of the work that the present members had done to make the day one to remember.

The general request was that we have another one in ten years.

Past members came from as far away as Gabbin, Geraldton, Perth, Mandurah, Busselton, Denmark, Esperance, Cunderdin and

Kojonup, and we had the pleasure of serving morning tea non-stop from 10am till mid-day. Lunch was enjoyed in groups under trees and under tarpaulins. Two ladies who had arrived from England that week, had their first taste of a typical Australian bush picnic, flies and all.

There was much talking and many happy reminiscences. Some of the older members had not seen each other for many years. Those present to trace the history of their previous farms and other local farms, and this created a lot of interest.

It followed a welcome by the president, Mr. Kevin Sexton, who then introduced Mr Les Grout as a member of an original family and also Shire representative for the local area. He spoke at length about the tennis club and the old Commodine school and of the many happy times enjoyed by so many of those present.

Photos were taken of the ex-Commodine school pupils and the people who were tennis club members prior to World War 2 (1939). There were many cameras in evidence and even a movie camera shooting film - this owned by a present member.

Four ornamental eucalypts have been planted - these to honour foundation families - the ladies being Mrs Mary Duncan (nee Pauley), Mrs. Eileen Quartermaine (nee Dart), Mrs Ada George (nee Modra), Mrs. Ellen Melon (nee Cann). This was a well photographed ceremony.

A sad, historic day for Commodine Tennis Club

The Commodine Tennis Club reunion and closure was held last Sunday, April 14.

Approximately 75 people returned for this sad and historic day.

Past members returned from as far away as Busselton, Willeton, Dandaragan, Mosman Park, Claremont, Maida Vale, Forrestfield, Tincurrin, Narrogin and Wickepin. There were also representatives of the Pumpdreys and Ten Mile Tennis Clubs as well as many local Cuballing residents.

It was nice to see the whole of the Leeson family together for this occasion. A lovely picnic style lunch was enjoyed by many who arrived early enough.

This allowed ample time for many to reminisce on bygone days in the area.

At 2pm a plaque was unveiled by the club's two life members Malcolm Gath and Ken Cavanagh. Mr Gath gave a history of the club from 1908 to 1990. This was followed by Mr Cavanagh who reminisced on incidences that had occurred over the years.

The club's present president Bernard Leeson welcomed and thanked all those who attended for helping to make this sad day more memorable.

Quite a number of people took the opportunity to have several games of tennis.

Following a delicious afternoon tea which was provided by the few present members, visitors and friends started wending their various ways home before dark.

CUBALLING WAR MEMORIAL *by Stephen Bowes*

The Cuballing Roll of Honour: F W Baker

William Baker was born in Sheffield, England and was educated at Huntsmans Garden State School. He came to Australia as a twenty two year old, and lived at a property called 'Whinham' in Claremont. His mother, Harriet Baker, lived in Cottesloe. Harriet gave William's occupation as railway platelayer, and he is also described as a labourer, skills in high demand in the railway town of Cuballing as farming began to flourish. William's father, Albert George Baker, appears to have remained in Sheffield.

When William enlisted for the Great War in Perth, February 1916, he gave his father as next of kin. If we may be granted a brief speculation, was this to protect his mother, should bad news need to be delivered?

William was made a Private with regimental number 33, in A Company, 44th Infantry Battalion, which sailed from Fremantle in June, 1916 aboard the SS Suevic, which carried the designation HMAT A29.

The 44th Battalion joined the other battalions of the newly formed Australian Third Division in England, at Lark Hill Camp, a small part of the much larger British Army training establishment on Salisbury Plain. As 'new chums' to the AIF, the Third Division had left Australia with only very basic training, while the First, Second, Fourth and Fifth Divisions had their new recruits allocated alongside battle hardened men who had served on the Gallipoli Peninsula, and had undergone some months of further training in camp in Egypt. Major-General John Monash set about whipping his Third Division in to shape with a regime of strenuous exercises and training to ready them for the front. To instil 'esprit de corps', he sought to distinguish his men from the other divisions by having them wear their slouch hats with the brim down. He was very proud when King George V reviewed his troops at Bulford, a short march from Lark Hill, on September 27. With the King and John Monash mounted on their steeds, twenty thousand men marched in platoon formation, twenty two abreast, past their monarch in a review which lasted over an hour. The Third Division troops then lined the route as the king rode back to the Royal Train at the station. The King was impressed, and Monash was delighted, by his men's showing and the king's reaction. Monash was becoming increasingly impatient to take his troops across The Channel.

The Third Division arrived in France in late 1916, beginning mid-November, sailing from Southampton to Le Havre. This was accomplished in small steamers and paddlewheelers, and many men were seasick. From Le Havre, they were carried in '40 Hommes 8 Chevaux' rail trucks (hommes=men, chevaux=horses) to Bailleul, in northern France, near the Belgian border, and began their first deployment in the nursery Armentieres Sector.

The Third Division participated in the successful Battle of Messines, in the Ypres sector of Belgian Flanders, beginning on June 6-7, and then took up defensive positions on the Messines front. During routine operations, William Baker, by now promoted to Lance Corporal, was killed in action on August 2. He has no known grave, and is commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium, which commemorates 56,000 men, including 6,178 Australians who served in the Ypres campaign and who have no known grave.
