


ground and the marquees that were set up ready for the music festival demolished. Thankfully the Shire staff were able to clean up the debris in time for the concert to go ahead.


COUNCIL NOTES

CUBALLING STORM FEBUARY 2020



On Friday the 14th February at approximately 5.30pm a freak storm ripped through the Cuballing townsite. With destructive winds and heavy rain the Cuballing Agricultural Hall roof stood little chance.

Trees were no match for the 'mini tornado' either being ripped out of the ground or snapped like twigs littering the roads with debris and causing traffic chaos.

The townsite of Cuballing recorded a mixture of rain measurements with the Shire office recording 27ml while further up Campbell street only 19ml was recorded in the gauge.

The Cuballing Hall now sits idle with tarps covering the damaged roof. A structural engineer has inspected the hall and will now issue a report to the Shire before repairs can commence. Unfortunately the hall has some interior damage as the rain that followed the wind caused some damage before the roof could be made weather proof.

Due to the extent of damage the repair process will take some time meaning the Cuballing Ag Hall will be out a commission some months.

With the hall out of action the Cuballing Line dancers have moved their Monday night dances to the Popanyinning Hall.

CUBALLING & POPANYINNING VOLUNTEER BUSH FIRE BRIGADE



Cuballing and Popanyinning Volunteer bush fire brigade members came together in Cuballing on Tuesday 4th February 2020 for an introduction to firefighting course.

Hand signals, how to use their appliance, refilling the appliance from a hydrant, radio protocol, team work and safety were some of the skills the twenty three bush fire brigade volunteers learnt.

Training sessions are usually held as needed and previous sessions have seen 6 or 7 volunteers attend. The recent training is to date the biggest training session held in Cuballing.



Upper Great Southern Volunteer Management Support Officer Anika Keeling stressed the importance of training, saying "We need to keep up-to-date with training sessions for the safety of the volunteers. They need the knowledge to put the fire out, how to prepare themselves when attending a fire and all other basic skills that come with been a volunteer fire brigade member"





OUR HISTORY—W.A BANK CUBALLING

The building on the corner of Alton and Campbell Streets once housed Cuballing's first bank, the West Australian Bank. The building was believed to have been constructed at the turnof-thecentury by James Fitt using local bricks and opened early in 1904 and was in business until 1924.

On 18 September 1915, Mr E.E. Schroeder took charge of the bank, bringing with him his love of roses. A year later the 'Narrogin Observer' reported that Mr Schroeder had changed his name to E.E.



Stirling. Mr Schroeder was a native of South Australia where many migrants had arrived from Germany many years before. However, there was much ill feeling in Cuballing towards this family because of the war situation. He was given little peace despite the fact that his sons were away in the A.I.F. Perhaps the local attitude to this gentleman, who served on the vestry of the Church of England and was active in social events, softened a little when on 26th October 1918 the 'Narrogin Observer' reported that Mr Stirling's son, Lt Leslie M. Player, had been awarded the Military Cross for bravery, having been wounded four times and gassed once.

Following the closure of the bank, the building was rented out as a private residence, the first tenants being Mr and Mrs Bee in 1925. After they moved from the bank to the post office in 1940 the premises were let to the Aboriginal family of Mr and Mrs Jones.

The Jones' daughter, Mrs Maxine Fumagalli, later wrote a thought-provoking book, 'South-west Noongar Woman', about her life. One chapter relates her family's experiences in Cuballing when she was a school girl. Her father, a loving, caring man, was a hard worker who had to travel out of the district for work. Her mother, equally kind and loving, had been man-powered and was working as a cook at the Pingelly Hotel. Consequently, it was left to the older sister, Emiline, whose husband, Sam Ninyette was a prisoner of war in Japanese hands, to care for Maxine, younger brother Ron and little sister May in the bank house.

Mrs Fumagalli recalls that there was always great excitement when Mum had the day off or Dad came home for a day or two. The children watched hopefully as the train came through each day. Maxine considered the bank house beautiful as Emiline's standards were high and she kept the floor of the long corridor highly polished. Although food was sometimes scarce, Emiline always managed to produce something nice for the youngsters and gave them a well-balanced diet.

Living in another house at the rear of the bank was another sister, Dorothy, who took care of her young brother-in-law, Lallie. Her husband, John Ninyette was away with the A.I.F. News of his death came while she was living in Cuballing. On the other hand, Sam Ninyette returned after seven years away, half that time as a prisoner of war. He was a shattered shell of a man, but after recovering at his spiritual tribal home in Brookton he was able to take up employment again with the railways.

OUR HISTORY—W.A BANK CUBALLING

After the Jones family moved from the bank house Mrs Edwards took it over and turned the building into a delicatessen, serving snacks, meals and afternoon teas as well. It became a popular place for young people. After a time she sold the business to Mr and Mrs Herbert, who also served fish and chips. After they retired the building reverted to a private dwelling. Several people lived there, including Mr and Mrs Fred Candy for a short period. It was later purchased by Graeme and Helen Wrankmore.

The Heritage Council of W.A. in 1996 awarded this house Category 3 which states that it is considered to have a lesser degree of significance: to be retained and conserved if possible.prior to any major changes or demolition a photographic record should be taken.

The building shares the intersection with the former Post Office. This intersection with the two buildings are remnants that mark an old commercial precinct of Cuballing.

The roof features a tall corbelled brick chimney with terra-cotta potted tops, timber battened eaves, and a triangular pediment that crowns the building's truncation, giving emphasis to the building's entrance. The pediment has a halt timber effect, barge board and a finial. The building bears the name, 'Western Australian Bank'.

The building is symmetrical about the entrance with a wide window with flattened arched fanlight, either side of the entrance. The windows have rendered decorative surrounds and sills.

A residence was built along the Alton Street elevation that is set back from the street alignment. The verandah extends across the residence and abuts the bank building. The residence and bank have back to back chimneys.

The interior of the bank is comprised of a single room, no physical evidence remains of its original purpose. The exterior of the residence features double-hung sash windows with side lights, and a grand entry door with side lights and leaded and stained glass fanlights. The interior of the residence retains simple arches supported on pilasters, pressed metal ceilings, decorative ceiling roses, cornices and skirtings.

A timber framed and lined enclosure with a lean-to roof now obscures the verandah. The residence has been further extended down the south elevation that once formed a laneway to the rear, and at the rear. The additions have lean-to roofs. The exterior of the entire building has been rendered.

The original entrance door way has been replaced by a window and now accommodates a bedroom.


