
PRESIDENT'S PEN AUGUST

At the July meeting, Council adopted the budget for 2022/23. It is a fairly conservative budget which reflects the rising cost of inputs in the shire's operations. The cost of fuel, parts, culverts, steel — the list goes on and on - continues to rise, as you would well know. Compared to other shires of our size in our area, our rates are low. Council aims to keep rate rises to a minimum whilst reflecting these rising costs and ensuring the long-term financial health of the Shire. Rate notices come out this month. If you are concerned about making payments, please contact the Shire staff to arrange a payment plan.

In July the Community Builders Program launched in the wheatbelt and Cuballing nominated two teams of four from Popanyinning and Cuballing. The program, funded by Rural Aid, aims to support local community builders to better understand and build their local and regional community and economy. It involves five "cluster musters" where representatives from the 14 shires involved get together for a workshop on themes identified at the first meeting. The first meeting was held in Wagin and the second in Darkan – both very interesting and thought-provoking days. The next cluster muster is in Cuballing on the 10th August and we have a chance to showcase our shire and activities – and have them critiqued. If you are interested in coming along, even if you aren't part of the team, please let me know.

On the subject of showcasing our shire, the inaugural Cuballing Winter Ball last weekend was an unqualified success. Despite freezing conditions, 150 people filled the Cuballing Agricultural Hall (hooray for the new reverse cycle airconditioning), ate delicious canapes provided by Christine Hill and danced the night away to local band, Trip. The hall has never looked so good (well done, Michelle) and thanks to our fabulous donors and participants, we have raised a sizeable amount of money for BlazeAid. We did ourselves proud!

COUNCIL SHORTS

Everyone will shortly be receiving their Rates Notices for 2022. This happens every year when Council adopts its Annual Budget. The raising of rates is the culmination of a lot of hard work by Councillors and staff as they work their way through Council's plans for the coming year. Here are a few highlights of Council's work.

Huge Roads Program

The Shire has secured funding to upgrade two major roads as part of the Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network. This program is a collaboration between Commonwealth and State Governments and the 42 Local Governments of the WA Wheatbelt. This will direct \$187 Million in roads funding to significant Local Government roads serving WA agriculture.

This will see over \$2.5 million spent on Cuballing East Road this year, with a further \$250,000 on Narrogin Wandering Road. This will be the first of several years of funding for these roads. This is in addition to our annual roads program of over \$1 million.

Equipment to do the job.

The biggest risk in such a large program is reliability of equipment. To ensure that we maintain the capability to do the works we are replacing two key pieces of equipment ahead of the construction season – a grader and a front-end loader. The other major risk is the ongoing impact of Covid. For that we will rely on sensible precautions and an adaptable and versatile staff.

Building Upgrades

This year will be the final year of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, a commonwealth program to invest in community infrastructure. Following on from work on the Shire Administration, Popanyinning Hall and Main Street last year we will we upgrades to the Cuballing Agricultural Hall, CWA building, Skate Park shelters and the final stage of the administration upgrade.

Community Events

Once again the Shire will support community events throughout the year. This year we are off to a flyer with a very successful Cuballing Winter Ball which raised thousands of dollars for BlazeAid. We will again support major events such as the Cuballing Music Festival and the Popanyinning Bonfire night, as well as annual events such as Australia Day, Anzac Day and school holiday activities.

Strategic Plan

Every four years the Shire conducts a major review of its Community Strategic Plan, and it is that time again. Already a few committed individuals are participating in the Community Builders program and those learnings will feed into our strategic planning. A key part of the planning process is seeking input from the community. When the time comes please join in. Your idea could be the one that changes everything. RATES INFORMATION

RATES INFORMATION

Rates are charged on all privately owned property within the Shire of Cuballing. The Shire includes Cuballing, Popanyinning, Yornaning and surrounding areas.

Rates are calculated as a portion of the independent valuation of each property. Townsite properties are valued differently to rural properties. Townsite property valuations reflect value of the land and structures on the property. Rural valuations only reflect the value of the land without any improvement.

RATES AND CHARGES

Council has increased rates by 10% for the 2022/23 financial year. This increase is an average across the whole of the Shire of Cuballing. Individual property rates may fluctuate depending upon property valuation changes.

Council has decided on this rate increase to:

- maintain services despite increasing insurance, utilities, wage and compliance costs; and
- offset a reduction in operating grant income.

Council believes that this decision will ensure the long term financial sustainability of the Shire of Cuballing.

PROPERTY REVALUATION

Property valuations are set independently by the Valuer Generals Office. A revaluation of all townsite properties has been completed. Rural properties are revalued annually. When comparing rates charges between 2021/22 and 2022/23, please note that the property valuation may have changed.

RATES INFORMATION

PENSIONERS & SENIORS

If you hold a current Seniors/Pensioner or other rate Concession Card (valid from July 2022) you may be eligible for a concessional rebate off your rates.

New applications are to be directed to the Water Corporation on 1300 659 951.

Pensioners/Seniors already receiving a rebate or deferment must provide a copy of their current pension card to the Shire of Cuballing to be eligible. A new application is not required.

Concessions are also available to Unimproved or Rural/Farming properties in a modified format as required by the Office of State Revenue. Further information may be obtained from the Shire Office and Water Corporation.

PAYMENT DIFFICULTIES

If you are having difficulties paying your rates it is essential you contact the Shire Office prior to the final due date for payment. Council may offer alternative payment arrangements to assist payment. Contact Council's Rates Officer, Careese Ranieri, who will be pleased to assist you.

2022 WASTE MANAGEMENT

The Shire of Cuballing has a \$40 Waste Management charge for all rural properties outside townsites.

The charge is included on each rates assessment. Property owners with more than one rates assessment will have the charge included on each assessment.

This charge looks to reflect a contribution by residents/businesses located outside townsites who are able to access Council's waste and recycling services at Waste Transfer Stations at Cuballing and Popanyinning.

KERBSIDE WASTE COLLECTION

Council operates a Kerbside waste collection service in townsites. Waste is collected weekly on Tuesdays with Recycling collected every second Tuesday.

Dryandra Woonta Felixer Workshop

Local landholders recently attended a workshop in Dryandra Woodland to learn about PHCC's Dryandra Woonta Project which includes the first Wheatbelt trial of the Felixer™ cat grooming trap.

Guest speakers included Travis (Jock)
Abraham, Wilman Noongar Elder, who
welcomed attendees to country. Dr
Karen Bettink (PHCC) gave an overview
of the Dryandra Woonta Project which
will include a non-toxic trial of the
Felixer™ on private property surrounding
Dryandra Woodland and other targeted
feral cat, fox and pig control to reduce
threats to numbats and chuditch. Dr
Judy Dunlop (WA Feral Cat Working
Group), who has previously trialled
the Felixer™ in the Pilbara, shared her
knowledge and demonstrated how the
Felixer™ identifies cats as a target animal.

John Read (Thylation), who invented

the Felixer, spoke to landholders via a prerecording about how Thylation took advantage of cats natural grooming behaviour to develop the Felixer™ which uses rangefinder sensors to distinguish target cats and foxes from non-target wildlife and spray targets with a measured dose of toxic 1080 gel. The Felixer™ is solar powered and photographs all animals detected. Attendees then enjoyed a demonstration and got to hear some of the audio lures used attract the feral cats. Thank you to all who attended the workshop.

Landcare matters

Hotham-Williams sub-catchment update



Carnaby's Black Cockatoos' Flying East

With nesting season soon upon us you may notice the return of Carnaby Black Cockatoos to the eastern parts of the catchment.

Returning from their winter feeding grounds on the Swan Coastal Plain, many Carnaby's head east to nest in wheatbelt areas in large ancient hollow bearing trees such as salmon gum and wandoo.

Generally they will migrate in pairs in late winter/spring and can travel 150km to the breeding sites where the female hatched. Once arriving they will prospect for suitable hollows. Indicative prospecting behaviour includes chewing or chipping around the edges of hollows and entering and existing hollows in pairs. The older/dominant pairs will get the best hollows with the younger pairs getting seconds which are generally less successful at raising a chick.

The female will lay two eggs with normally only one surviving. The egg will be incubated for 30 days, then the chick will hatch and grow for another 70 days before fledging (leaving the nest). It is critical that a fresh water supply is available within 2km of the nest, and enough food within 6-12 km.

Flocks of males will travel to find food for the females and their chicks, returning

mid-morning and late afternoon to feed them. The female will leave the nest to have a drink and be fed by the male. She will spend less time in the nest as the chick grows.

HOME SAFETY

You do not need to be at home for there to be a house fire

West Australians are urged to not leave e-Rideables (e-scooters, e-stakeboards) and other household items containing lithium-ion batteries charging overnight or when they are not at home due to their potential to overheat and cause devastating home fires.

Batteries can overheat when left on charge or when they are faulty. Once the battery explodes, it can end up metres from where it was charging and a small fire can spread quickly engulfing an entire home in just minutes.

Fire investigators are seeing a rise in the number of fires caused by lithium-ion batteries where the home has either been significantly damaged or completely destroyed.

Here are a few things you can do to protect you and your home from a house fire:

- Check electrical items and cords for signs of wear and tear before using them. Don't use damaged or dented equipment.
- Never leave batteries charging when no one is home, or in unsupervised areas such as garages.
- Make sure when charging batteries they are placed on a hard surface, and are not left charging on bedding, couches, carpets or clothing.
- Don't leave batteries charging once they have reached 100% as they can overheat.
- Take care when purchasing batteries or devices online or second-hand. Replacement batteries and electrical cords should only be purchased from reputable companies.
- Batteries are classed as hazardous waste and should never be placed in your kerbside bins. You can find your nearest battery recycling bin by contacting your local government or visiting recycleright.wa.gov.au. For more information go to dfes.wa.gov.au/safetyinformation


