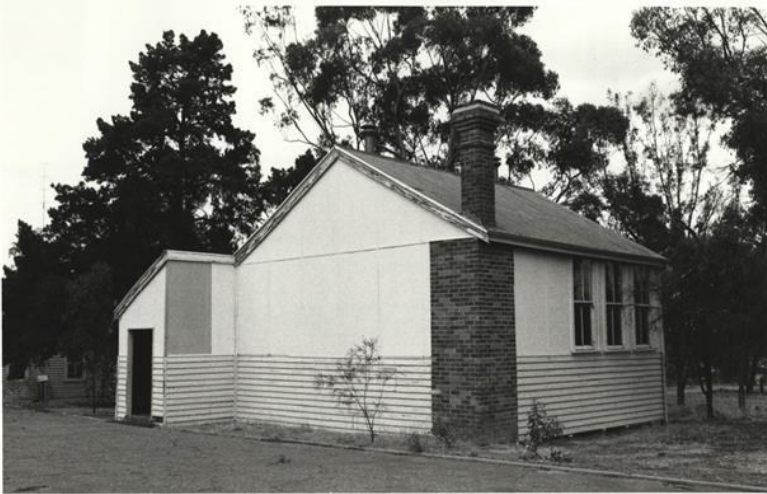

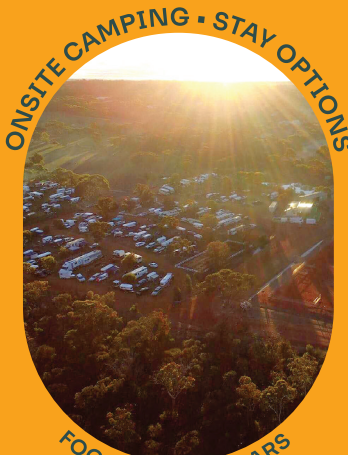

COUNCIL SHORTS

Application for Development Approval – Piggery (animal husbandry – intensive) expansion – various lots – 519 Popanyinning West Road, Popanyinning

Council approved the development application submitted by Glenlevit Piggery for a large-scale piggery expansion and feed mill on various blocks at 519 Popanyinning West Road, Popanyinning. A number of conditions and advice/guidelines were applied to this approval.

Councillor Attendance Fees, Allowances and Expenses for 2026/27

In accordance with the recommendations of the recent WA Salaries and Allowances Tribunal determination, Council adopted the proposed meeting fees, annual allowances and expenses for the Elected Members and independent committee members for the 2026/27 financial year.

Privacy and Information Sharing (PRIS) Policy

Council adopted a Privacy and Information Sharing Policy to establish a clear governance framework for how the Shire collects, uses, protects and shares personal and government information. The Policy responds to the introduction of the *Privacy and Responsible Information Sharing Act 2024 (WA)* and supports the Shire's readiness for new privacy and information-sharing obligations commencing from 1 July 2026.

Interconnecting Wheatbelt Trails

Council endorsed and adopted the Beverley–Narrogin Transport Trail Strategic Plan, Feasibility Study and Interconnecting Wheatbelt Rail Trails concept in order to advocate to the State Government for funding to progress the 250+ km regional cycling and walking network.

The Shires of Beverley, Brookton, Pingelly, Cuballing and Narrogin jointly applied and were successful for the WA Bicycle Network Grants Program to develop the Beverley–Narrogin Transport Trail Feasibility Study. This project defines two complementary trail experiences between Beverley and Narrogin: the Green Route, a 101 km off-road trail running alongside the Great Southern Railway and suitable for families, walkers and cyclists of all abilities; and the Orange Route, a 213 km on-road cycle touring route using scenic backroads through the Wheatbelt, including a link to Dryandra Woodland National Park. Trailheads are proposed at Beverley (Apex Park), Brookton (Pioneer Park), Pingelly (Pioneer Park), Cuballing (Youth and Community Park) and Narrogin (Visitor Information Centre).

WALGA Central Country Zone Meeting Friday 17th April 2026

In mid-April the Shire of Cuballing hosted the WA Local Government Association Central Country Zone meeting, with over 50 delegates and staff from 15 local governments in our region attending on the day along with representatives from the Wheatbelt Development Commission, Main Roads WA, Telstra, and the Australian Bureau of Statistics.



WALGA Zones are geographically aligned groupings of Local Governments in Western Australia

that act as the foundational building blocks for the sector's political and strategic representation. They ensure grassroots issues are elevated to the state level.

The primary purposes of the Zones include:

- **Electoral Representation:** They directly elect representatives to the WALGA State Council, which is the peak decision-making body representing all member Local Governments.
- **Policy Formulation:** They review the State Council agenda, propose regional issues, and help develop sector-wide legislative and policy initiatives.
- **Advocacy:** They ensure that regional, rural, and metropolitan concerns are addressed in WALGA advocacy efforts directed at both the State and Federal Governments.

Information Exchange: They provide a forum for local councils to discuss shared challenges, share strategic knowledge, and provide feedback to their State Councillors.

Our Shire President Cr Adrian Kowald gave an opening address to the delegates, providing an overview of the Shire of Cuballing along with outlining achievements to date, current challenges and future priority services and projects identified by our community.

We want to acknowledge the amazing efforts of our staff members Donna Screech, Sue Hann, Donna Harvison, Geoff Hann and Jo Lindley who worked tirelessly and went above & beyond to set up the Cuballing Ag Hall and provide the most amazing catering service on the day that was so very much appreciated and acclaimed by all who attended.

Winter

Smoke Hazard & Motorists

Although most paddock burning has now been completed, property owners should remain aware of the danger smoke can pose when it drifts across main roads. A recent incident on the Great Southern Highway within our Shire saw thick smoke create sudden zero visibility, leading to a collision between vehicles. Fortunately, only minor injuries were reported, although two vehicles were written off.

Before undertaking any burn-off, property owners should carefully consider weather conditions, visibility on nearby roads, and the potential consequences. If smoke from a burn contributes to a serious accident or fatality, the owner may face significant responsibility and liability.

Hotham-Williams sub-catchment update

NRM is the management of natural resources such as land, water, soils, plants and animals. It brings together land use planning, water management, biodiversity conservation and sustainability of industries such as agriculture, mining, tourism, fisheries and forestry.



Cyclone Narelle in the Works

Cyclone Narelle threw a giant spanner in our Hotham River works scheduled for late March. While the cyclone itself didn't reach Boddington, projected water flows made us have a closer look and ultimately decide to defer works until next year.

River rehabilitation is the modification of the banks using a combination of re-sloping, rocks and provide woody debris to create a surface over which water can travel safely without risk of erosion and to habitat for the flora and fauna that live in and near the river. 'Rehab' sometimes involves adding structures that can be used by humans without impacting the fragile environment in a negative way.

The plan was to carry out our next stage of works for restoring the river, on the banks opposite to the public reserve area, focussing on over half a kilometre of compacted and largely bare banks, but for the paperbarks and flooded gums clinging to the edges.

By mid-March the rocks and logs had been delivered, the contractor was booked, and the ground staff were poised for action. Most importantly, the local Elders and Knowledge Holders were ready to Welcome us and be part of returning a piece of the river to a healthier version of itself. Then came the forecast of 100mm local rainfall and a possible 1m rise in river levels. So, in the name of safety and caution, we called it – we should not go ahead with on-ground works at this time. But this certainly did not mean cancelling plans entirely - we will recommence next season when the water is at its lowest point.

How beautiful is the Hotham River? It's not often we get waterways this size in drier parts of the southwest. Just look at the wide-spanning and chilly-deep Ranford Pool, and the curving streams through the nest of paperbarks and flooded gums down to the town bridge and the pool above the weir. Notice the long, winding connection with Country upstream through farmland to Pumphreys Bridge - another Cultural place of meeting located on a Dreaming track. Not only do we need to protect these precious areas, but we also need to restore them – for acknowledgement of Culture & Country, for community access to natural areas, and for the flora and fauna that call it home.

In the coming months, take a stroll to the waterside at Ranford Pool and look towards the other

side of the river – notice the grandmother trees in need of care and attention, waiting for the next generation to grow around them. And then check it out again this time next year when we have begun the process of doing just that, starting with work on the riverbank itself.

Great Results for April Numbat Drive Survey

PHCC is proud to jointly fund a twice-yearly numbat drive survey in Dryandra Woodland National Park coordinated by Dr Tony Freind with support from the Numbat Task Force.

The result from the recent April Drive Survey were 23 numbat sightings. The population is proving to be steady with previous year's results being 2025-24, 2024-19, 2023-24, 2022-23 and 2021-28 individual numbats.

This is great news for Dryandra's numbat population. We'd like to thank Dr Tony Friend and the Numbat Task Force for all of the volunteer hours they put in to carrying out this important monitoring of numbats in Dryandra Woodland National Park.

Fox Traps to Loan

Did you know that PHCC has fox traps to loan to landholders?

There has recently been an increase in fox activity reported to PHCC by landholders in our region. Foxes are a huge threat to agriculture and native animals. Foxes injure and kill livestock, chickens and are a primary cause of decline and extinction of native fauna.

There are a number of management strategies to control foxes including trapping, baiting and ground shooting. The Glovebox Guide for Managing Foxes is a great resource to help you plan a management strategy for controlling foxes on your property. If you would like to loan a fox trap contact PHCC's Farmers for Fauna Coordination christine.townsend@peel-harvey.org.au. If you have a property near Dryandra Woodland National Park contact Christine to learn how you may be eligible to have a contractor conduct free fox and feral cat control on your property. PHCC are able to support landholders with pest management through the Farmers for Fauna Project with funding from the Numbat Neighbourhood Project.

Saturday 23rd; The PPA organised and hosted the Volunteer Week lunch for our local volunteers.

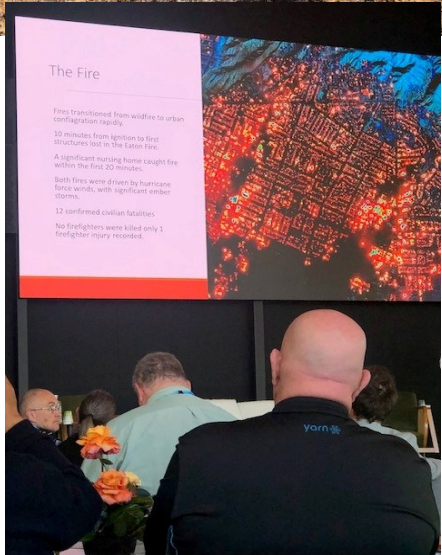
